DO THIS: Get an idea of your students' Bible knowledge by playing a **Bible Trivia** game using the questions below and their **Student Notebooks**.

• Have your students get into groups of 2-3 and pull out their **Student Notebooks.** Read out the following Bible Trivia questions and have them write down their answers to each question. Reveal the answer to the questions at the end and have your students keep track of their score. Give the team with the most correct answers some candy from your tub as a prize!

1. How many books are in the Bible? 66 books

2. What does the word "Bible" mean? "library"

3. How many human authors wrote the Bible? 40

4. What is the first book in the Bible? Genesis

DO THIS: Read **2 Timothy 3:16-17** as a group and then lead your students in a discussion about the passage using the questions below.

- Tell your students to open their Bibles to 2 Timothy 3:16-17 and then have someone read it out loud for the group.
- **ASK:** What do you think it means that "all Scripture is inspired by God"?
- ASK: How can the Bible be meaningful or useful to us?

DO THIS: Lead your students in a conversation about the history of the Bible using the Bible Trivia and questions below and on the next page.

- ASK: Why do you think God chose so many human authors to write His Word?
- ASK: Why do you think God chose to have His Word written in three different languages?
- **ASK:** Why do you think God chose to have His words and story written in a book?

DO THIS: Lead your students in a conversation about the different purposes of the Bible using the **whiteboard and marker** from your tub.

- Draw two lines to make four even boxes on your whiteboard. Then, hand the whiteboard and marker to a student and have them draw a picture of a **textbook** in one of the boxes. Then, give the whiteboard to a different student and have them draw a picture of a **love letter** in another box. Have two other students draw a **map** and a **phone** in the remaining boxes.
- The Bible is like a textbook that tells us the history of the past, a love letter than reveals God's love for us, a map that guides us through life, and a phone that allows us to hear from God
- **ASK:** Of these four pictures, which would you say is how you view the Bible the most? Why do you view it that way?
- **ASK:** On a scale of 1-10, how important would you say the Bible is to you right now?
- **ASK:** Do you want to read the Bible more? Why or why not?
